In 1929 the Methodist Church was unable to keep the church open and it closed. In 1939, the Christian Church with elders Virgil, Harry, and Paul Virgin obtained permission to use the old Methodist building. This is the present Oldtown Christian Church.

The program is being funded by a grant from the Steele-Reese foundation and is a partnership involving the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, The University of Louisville, The University of the Cumberlands and the William Whitley Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution.

Member Don Root then updated to chapter related to an educational effort being conducted in partnership with the Military Science Department of Knox Central High School. This program is providing instructional materials to JROTC classes to support the curriculum in the area of Early American History. Cadets completing the course of instruction will be presented certificates of completion at a ceremony to be conducted in May.

Captain Charles Gatliff Chapter (continued) at Knox Central High School, Barbourville, KY

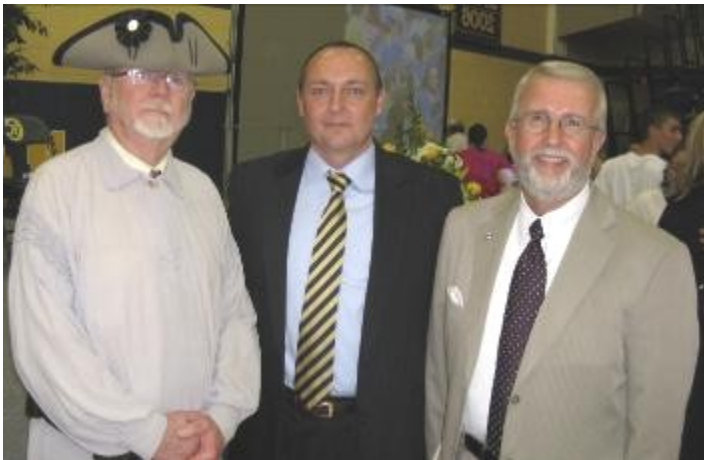

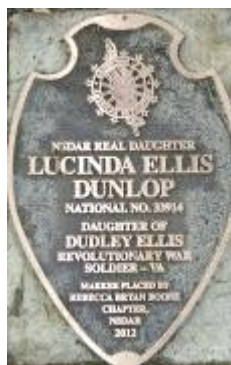

Description of the flag

This is an almost square blue flag with 13 white six-pointed stars arranged 3:2:3:2:3 Rather than the normal stars which appear to be composed of triangles, they're composed of three lines that intersect. The ends of the lines are slightly tapered.

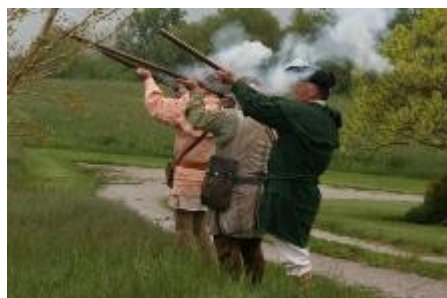

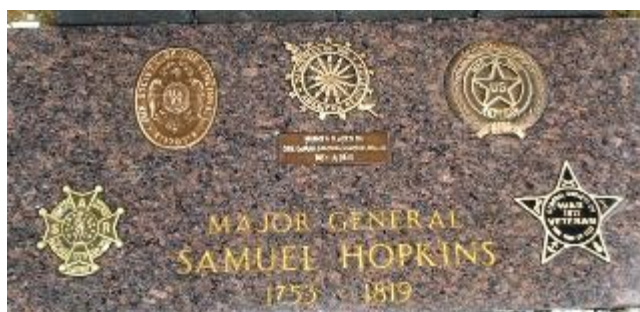

SAR contest open to high schoolers

SPECIAL TO THE NEWS-EXPRESS

The National Office of the Sons of American Revolution sponsors an annual writing contest, inviting students to submit essays on events that shaped American history.

Approved for listing by the National Association of Secondary School Principals, the George & Stella Knight Essay Contest is open to sophomore, juniors and seniors in high school who are U.S. citizens or legal aliens.

The contest is for an original, researched and proven essay topic written in English. The topic of each essay shall deal with one of the following: An event, person, philosophy or ideal associated with the American Revolution, the Declaration of Independence or the framing of the United States Constitution.

The month of April offers several historical dates that might stimulate students' thoughts and encourage their participation.

- April 13, 1743: Thomas Jefferson's birthday, lead author of the Declaration of Independence and concepts embodied in the Constitution and Bill of Rights.
- April 18, 1775: Paul Revere's ride to Concord and Lexington, Mass., with the message that the British were coming.
- April 19, 1775: Start date for the American Revolutionary War at Lexington and Concord.
- April 30, 1789: Birthday of the United States, George Washington inaugurated as first president.

This is a national contest and each state chapter will submit that state's winning essay to the national office of Sons of American Revolution.

The first-place winner will receive \$2,000, second-place will receive \$1,000, and third-place will receive \$500.

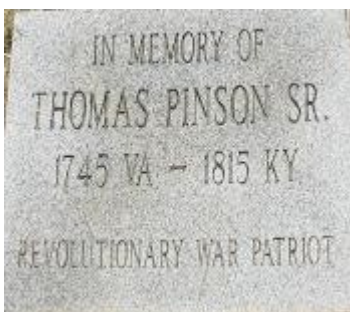

SAR remembers Thomas Pinson Sr.

On Sunday, May 20, the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution dedicated a marker in memory of Thomas Pinson Sr. on the Pinson Cemetery located behind the Joes Creek Church of Christ on Lower Johns Creek.

Pinson supplied beef to the Revolutionary Army during the war and was rewarded with a land grant for his service.

In about 1795 Pinson loaded up his family of nine children and made the trek from his home in Grayson County, Va., to what was then Floyd County, Ky., where they came to the banks of the Big Sandy River near the current town of Pikeville in search of land to raise his family.

Pinson could not obtain title for suitable land for the family to settle on in the Pikeville area. His family then moved on to settle land all up and down the waters of Johns Creek from Millers Creek to Bent Branch and more.

Pinson's children and their descendants populated much of the Johns Creek area with family ties that include Carter, Meade, Howard, Ratliff, Clevenger, Clark and many

others that still reside there.

The ceremony was attended by about 50 descendants of Thomas Pinson along with state and local SAR and DAR representatives.

Big Sandy SAR Chancellor John David Preston opened the ceremony by introducing a color guard made up of SAR members from the Big Sandy and Governor Isaac Shelby chapters in period dress.

The color guard then marched up the hill to the marker site and displayed a number of flags — from the current stars and stripes to Revolutionary War battle flags.

SAR member Bruce Austin played the national anthem on a trumpet followed by an invocation by Sam Hatcher. After the SAR and DAR pledge was recited, descendants Roger Ratliff, Shalimar Labreche and Charlie Pinson spoke of the life and achievements of the patriot Thomas Pinson.



A BIG DAY

World War II vets from Kentucky, Ind. visit D.C. memorial on anniversary of invasion

WASHINGTON — On the 68th anniversary of D-Day, World War II veterans from Kentucky and Indiana were cheered, serenaded and saluted Wednesday by members of Congress and others on a one-day visit to the nation's capital.

"It's wonderful, wonderful," said Harry Bush, 91, of Richmond, Ky., as he gazed across the expanse of the National World War II Memorial moments after Louisville's Ladies for Liberty — Wanda Martin, Angela Glotzbach and Jeanette Kays — sang "Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy" in perfect Andrews Sisters harmony.

Bush was one of 30 veterans and 26 volunteers from Kentucky and Indiana who saw Washington through the Honor Flight program, which transports veterans to Washington to see their memorials free of charge.

While none of those from Kentucky and Indiana were on the beaches of Normandy in France on June 6, 1944, making the trip on D-Day's 68th anniversary "added an extra punctuation point," said Brian Duffy, president of the Bluegrass Chapter of Honor Flight.

John Vaughn, 91, of Glasgow, Ky., was visiting the Vatican in Rome — which was liberated on June 4, 1944 — the day of the Normandy landings.

"When I came out, people on the street said, 'They've crossed the (English) Channel,'" Vaughn recalled. "It was just another invasion to me."

Vaughn had joined the National Guard in 1940, a year before the United States entered the war.

After the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor and the Americans joined the fight against Imperial Japan and Nazi Germany, Vaughn and his artillery unit moved in and out of various Army divisions in England, North Africa, Sicily, France, and into Germany.

A veteran of five beach landings, Vaughn earned eight battle stars and the French Medal of Honor. He suffered one flesh wound, during the fierce fighting at Anzio, Italy.

"I didn't even know I was hit," and because it didn't look very serious, he didn't call for a medic. "So I didn't get a Purple Heart," he said, chuckling.

Edgar Casada, 88, of Somerset, Ky., wore his Air Force radioman's uniform and walked ramrod straight onto the memorial grounds.

He taught radio mechanics school in Madison, Wis., during the war.

Asked his secret for keeping trim enough to fit perfectly into his uniform, Casada smiled. "I didn't know I had one."

The veterans got off their chartered bus to cheers and waving flags held by schoolchildren from Virginia. People visiting the National World War II Memorial frequently walked up to the vets to shake their hands and thank them for their service.

George Snyder, 90, of Owensboro, Ky., was in the U.S. Signal Corps in Italy, France, Germany and Austria during the war. This was his first look at the memorial.

"It looks great," Snyder said. Earl Fort, 87, and his brother,

Wilburn Fort, 90, both of Owensboro, Ky., came to Washington together.

Earl Fort was a Navy seaman 1st Class, while Wilburn Fort served in the Army Corps of Engineers. Both were in the Pacific.

Earl Fort's merchant ship carried the first radar systems "to every Allied port in the southwest Pacific," he said.

"They told us they were a secret and there were 50 soldiers guarding" the equipment, he said. Whenever there was any shooting, his ship's job was to "go and hide," he said.

Wilburn Fort came behind the Marines after Pacific island invasions — "for me, the war was 100 yards in diameter," he said.

His equipment was ready to go to Japan when the atomic bomb suddenly ended the war.

"When Harry Truman dropped that bomb, I thanked the good Lord," he said.

Bush, in the Army a year before the United States entered the war, was a medic in New Guinea and the Philippines.

"I was the only one of 115 (medics) who didn't get malar-

ia," Bush said, adding he still can walk 10 miles any time he wishes. "God's been good to me."

While Bush was in New Guinea, his unit was visited by a U.S. senator from Kentucky, Albert Benjamin "Happy" Chandler Sr.

"He asked us a lot of questions," Bush recalled as he spoke to Chandler's grandson, Rep. Ben Chandler, D-6th District, who has known Bush for years.

"That's right," Chandler said of his grandfather. "He was on the Senate Military Affairs Committee and he wanted to do anything he could for the troops."

Other Kentucky lawmakers who came to pay their respects to the soldiers, sailors and airmen were Reps. John Yarmuth, D-3rd District, and Brett Guthrie, R-2nd District, and Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell.

"These men are celebrities for the first time in their lives today, and it is nice to be able to come here today and help them receive these honors," Yarmuth said.

McConnell, whose father was in the war, said, "We have no finer people than the greatest generation."
