KYSSAR Essay Winner Gets Perfect Score on ACT Test & Louisville Thruston Chapter (continued)

ACHIEVER | WILL STRENCH

North Oldham junior aces ACT – twice

Will Strench, 16, had his driver's license for only a few days when he drove to an ACT testing center in February. When it was all over, he was so relieved that he drove to Thornton's for some candy on the way home.

His relief turned to excitement when he received his score: a 36 composite, the highest score possible on the standardized college exam. He scored 36 on English and science, and 35 on math and reading.

When he took the test again in March - a requirement for all public school juniors in Kentucky - he scored another 36 composite with identical scores on the individual tests. Fellow North Oldham High School junior David Glenn - who was featured in Neighborhoods in February for his 36 on the December 2012 also scored another 36 in test March.

On average, fewer than one-tenth of 1 percent of students score a 36 on a given testing date, according to ACT. Forty-two students from Kentucky, including 16 Louisville-area students, scored a composite 36 in 2012.

Will lives in Prospect with his parents, Mary and Bill Strench. His sister, Kaylen, is a freshman at Rice University. He is a junior at North Oldham High School.

To prepare, Will took a multiweek prep course offered at his school. He also took practice tests and studied review books. He said that all the writing he's done for English classes prepared him well for the grammar sections of the test.

Will's strategy is to cross out all the possible answers he knows aren't right as he goes through the questions. "If I know I'm not choosing that one, I cross it out and move through it. If I'm unsure, I leave it." He says that habit helps him check back over his work.

He said he'd heard not to worry if the science questions were unfamiliar, and he said his friend David Glenn gave him the best advice of all for that section: Pretend you like what you're reading. He also believes that using the process of elimination served him well

He gives credit to his parents and

his English teachers and the "great math teachers, who taught me the right way to think" about math problems

He said his parents, teachers, and friends were all excited about his score, and "I got a lot of love from my youth group" at St. Francis in the Fields Episcopal Church. He said his parents bought him a watch to "celebrate everything."

will is in the process of visiting colleges, where he intends to pursue the studies of history and the German language. He recently won the George and Ella Knight essay contest in the Louisville-Thruston Chapter of the Kentucky Society, Sons of the American Revolution. He advanced to win the state level competition and expects to hear the results of the national competition soon.

He wrote about "foreign policy in the American Revolution, beyond declaring independence but looking for cooperation in the future," he said.

David Green, teacher at North Oldham, said that Will's hard work sets him apart from other naturally gifted students.

Green said that Will takes advantages of every opportunity given him, and "he studies because he wants to learn as much as he can about every subject. He joins organizations because they offer opportunities to experience things that can be experienced no place else. He has chosen to participate in competitions like the Sons of the American Revolution Essay Contest because he enjoys testing himself.'

Will said: "I try not to worry about everything. My faith is important to me; it helps me keep perspective. I've been given great opportunities and I try to do my best with what I've been given."

Wounded Warrior Turkey Hunt






Wounded Warrior turkey hunt Fredonia, KY.

The John Manire Chapter, SAR held its regular monthly meeting at the Kentucky Veterans Cemetery –West in Hopkinsville, KY . After the opening ceremonies President Robert L. Fears introduced Mr. John Brame VFW Post 1913 Commander who presented Mr. Delbert D. Cayce III with an award honoring him as the last John Manire Chapter SAR member who was a veteran of World War II. Mr. Cayce served from 27 Apr 1944 to 1 Jul 1946 in the U.S. Navy aboard the USS Shoshone. He served as a signalman on a four man crew of a 36 foot LCVP (landing craft vehicle personnel) ferrying Marines from their ships to the Beaches of Iwo Jima.

President Fears also awarded the Distinguished Service Bronze award to Mr. David C. Smith honoring him as the founding President of the John Manire Chapter and for his continued service to our Chapter holding multiple offices for over thirty years. Mr. Smith was unable to attend and Mr. Delbert D. Cacye III accepted the award on his behalf.

The Featured Speaker for the evening was Mr. Richard A. Stanley, Director, KY Veterans Cemetery – West. Mr. Stanley provided a brief background on the founding of the KY Veterans Cemetery-West and gave thanks to the NSSAR and DAR for their continued support of the cemetery. He reminded everyone about what it means to be a veteran and how we are indebted to them for their service. He pointed out the Monument to Revolutionary War Veterans who settled in Christian County, KY erected in a joint effort by the John Manire Chapter, SAR and the KY Dept. of Veterans Affairs in 2012 as a good example of a lasting tribute to some of our nation's first veterans.
