

Message from the State President

Compatriots of the Kentucky Society,

In the June newsletter of the Kentucky Society, my message focused on the educational goals of the SAR. In this issue I would like to focus on the patriotic goals of the SAR.

The Patriotic goals can be accomplished through a variety of activities and events. These include:

Promoting within our communities the principles on which our nation was founded. This can take many forms including having our color guards participate in civic and patriotic events and observances (i.e. Independence Day, Veterans Day, Armed Forces Day, Flag Day, Patriots Day, Bill of Rights Day, Yorktown Day, Constitution Day, etc.).

Recognizing those citizens providing public service, such as law enforcement officers, firefighters, and Emergency Medical Technicians. Included in this are the young men and women who are leaders in our communities whether they be in various youth programs, JROTC/ROTC cadets, or volunteers within their communities.

Honoring and supporting the sacrifices of our Veterans, especially those confined to residential or hospital facilities.

We are now entering what has traditionally been the most active time of the year for the Kentucky Society, namely September through November. Many of the events being planned in the next few months are patriotic in nature including the many Patriot grave markings scheduled by several chapters. (N.B. Patriot grave markings scheduled in Kentucky are listed on the KYSSAR website at www.kyssar.org/wordpress1/propmemsvc/.) If you have never participated in a Patriot grave marking, I invite you to attend one in your area to see how you can get involved. In addition, there is Constitution Day on 17 September. Near the end of this period is Veterans Day. As you can see, in the next few months there are numerous patriotic opportunities for members of the Kentucky Society.

Chapters with established programs should have no problem participating in patriotic events. The newer chapters or chapters looking to grow their activities may encounter some questions in finding or developing patriotic activities in which to participate. For these chapters I would suggest they contact chapters with well-developed programs for advice and guidance. The Kentucky Society's Council of Chapter Presidents (CoCP) was created as a forum where the chapters of Kentucky can discuss issues and share ideas on how to develop chapter activities. If your chapter is not already participating in the Council of Chapter Presidents meetings, I recommend it do so in the future. A guideline for developing chapter programs and engaging with local communities is available for any chapter interested in learning more. Other avenues for participation can be accessed through collaboration with other patriotic organizations such as the DAR, Vietnam Veterans of America, VFW, and American Legion.

I encourage all members to support or develop patriotic events to the greatest extent possible. It is particularly important to support these events in your local communities. Support of local events is the best method of engaging your community and providing recruitment opportunities for the SAR.

The NSSAR and KSAAR have a Surgeon General or Surgeon among the list of officers. The responsibilities of this office are similar: advise the organization of any health matters which may be of concern to the membership, offer advice on good health to the members, and be available during meetings if required by the members. According to the KSSAR constitution, "Each chapter shall have a President, Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, and such other officers as it may elect." At its meeting in December 2020, the Lafayette Chapter added a surgeon to its list of approved officers. Other chapters in the state may want to consider adding the position. Although the NSSAR requires the surgeon be a licensed physician of medicine or osteopathy, other health professionals (dentist, nurse, emergency medical technician, etc.) could serve in this position. The Lafayette Chapter constitutional amendment states: 'The Surgeon shall be a member of the Medical Profession licensed in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. He shall offer advice on good health to the members and be available during meetings if required by the members." The current health environment supports the need for such a position at the chapter level, and chapter surgeons could provide a pipeline for the office at the state and national levels.







My Blessed, Wretched Life: Rebecca Boone's Story



Rebecca's own story, as imagined creatively by Sue Kelly Ballard, is so captivating, so gut-wrenchingly realistic, so obviously genuine, we begin to acknowledge who really moved America westward: our pioneer mother ancestors. Ballard captures every mood and moment of Rebecca's life in the backwoods and on the frontier with accuracy and passion, with authenticity and beauty, and at a pace that keeps the reader diving headlong into each new page eager to swallow up what happens next. Ballard's descriptions of the sights and sounds of the sylvan wilderness, of life's daily routine around a cabin set in a clearing made in the woods, and of the people and animals, both welcomed and unwelcomed, who come there are not segregated into long passages, but are tossed in generously as short snippets on top of the action, keeping the reader easily imagining the setting and circumstances as the story roars ahead. When a dozen things are happening at once, it takes a skilled frontier woman and a talented writer to keep everyone and everything moving along together.
